The PTFA has recently supplied the school with our Accelerated Reading Programme, four new laptops and continues to support our After-School Provision, as well as Relax Kids. This year the PTFA has paid for the school to have Musical Pathways in P1-4 and purchased half of our new numeracy scheme. The work they do and the funds they raise through grant application and fundraising really supports us in the work that we do here at St Mary's and we are so lucky to have them. Classes at St Mary's Primary School

In St Mary's Primary School we have six classes.

Year One , Year Two, Year Three , Year Four , Year Five/Six and Year Six/Seven .

Our Pupil Teacher Ratio is extremely low with one teacher for every 21 children.

We have two composite classes i.e which may change from year to year depending on the numbers of children in the school.

We endeavour to keep our class sizes small so that children gain the full advantage of individual support from their teacher.

To this end we also employ classroom assistants in all classes particularly the Foundation Stage to support the learning of all children.

So parents can be assured that all children in St Mary's will "be the best they can be" and will reach their full potential.

General Information about the school



St Mary's Primary School is a Catholic Maintained School set in the beautiful Fermanagh landscape. You can find us on the Arney Road about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the village of Bellanaleck and beside the village of Arney.

We are across the road from St Mary's church, nestled between the GAA Football Pitch and the Millennium Hall: right at the heart of the community.



We have just recently in November 2020 completed work on a new double mobile on our school site which is a fantastic addition to our school.

The school also boasts a brand new outdoor classroom which incorporates Poly Tunnel and Planting area which facilitates learning around the area of The World around Us, an essential component of the Revised Curriculum.

Pastoral Care

At St Mary's Pastoral Care permeates all aspects of school life. It reflects the values attitudes and beliefs of our Catholic faith and involves all members of our school community-staff, pupils, parents and the school chaplain.

We strive to create an atmosphere in which children feel secure, know they are valued as individuals and reach their full and true potential, spiritually, morally, physically and intellectually.

The atmosphere in the school is based upon respect and tolerance where good relationships between staff, parents and pupils are the very essence of the school.

All staff are committed to creating an environment of care and trust where children are happy, confident and considerate of the needs of others.

We recognise and value the role that parents play in the education of their children and every effort will be made to make parents feel welcome and to empower parents to help their children as best they can.

We ensure that all children have a voice in the school -our democratically elected school council ensures that everyone has their say on everything that goes on in the school.

Playground friends ensure that everyone is happy and content at break and lunchtimes. We always help each other out.

Positive Behaviour Management

Good order and discipline is established and maintained in St Mary's through the implementation of our Positive Behaviour Management Policy. In St Mary's Positive Behaviour is rewarded and praised at all times. We pride ourselves on the beautiful behaviour of the children who attend this school

The foundation of this policy is built upon the establishment of good relationships between pupils and teachers which can only be achieved by positive, stimulating teaching and learning being experienced by all children across the school.

Through our Positive Behaviour Policy we concentrate on recognising rewarding and praising all instances of success evident throughout all areas of school life. This will be achieved by issuing individual and class rewards, school assemblies, newsletters etc.



Safeguarding

Safeguarding/Child Protection is everyone's concern at St Mary's. We have a very active Safeguarding/Child Protection Policy in place which ensures that all our children are protected and are safe at all times.

The Revised Curriculum

"St Mary's Primary School promotes high achievement and learning for life by working with children to achieve a broad and balanced curriculum delivered with support and encouragement to succeed."

In line with the Revised Northern Ireland Primary Curriculum it is the aim of this school to:-

- **Physical Education** (focusing on the development of knowledge, skills and understanding through play and a range of physical activities)
- Religious Education

The Revised Curriculum in St Mary's

Language and Literacy

Language and Literacy are fundamental in the development of each individual child's ability to interact, express and communicate with confidence.

Children's knowledge, skills and understanding are nurtured through a range of talking and listening and reading and writing activities.

Pupils in the Foundation Stage and in Key Stage 1 use supplementary reading material. The school also teaches Synthetic Phonics through the Read Write Inc. approach.


In Key Stage 2 pupils use an extensive range of class novels and supplementary reading material. The school uses the Read Write Inc Language and Literacy scheme to support the development of Literacy.

The school also does the Accelerated Reading Programme from Year 3-7 to promote independent reading at home and school.

The school provides opportunities to celebrate children's reading achievements such as Parents Evenings, Assemblies etc.

The school promotes children's writing through Read Write Inc as well as bringing in Storytellers, Authors and Poets to stimulate writing and ideas.

Every year we have a special Literacy Week dedicated to promoting books and reading for enjoyment, which our children love taking part in.

Mathematics & Numeracy

The Foundation Stage and Key Stages 1 and 2, aim to develop the application of mathematics and numeracy across the curriculum and in real life situations. Children are encouraged to explore and investigate a wide range of purposeful activities. In all stages pupils are involved in making full use of electronic sources, practical materials and resources. Children are stimulated through practical opportunities to further develop and use their mathematical knowledge and skills.

Children are provided with valuable experiences which enable them to develop: processes in mathematics, number, measures, shape and space and handling data. We have just purchased a new Numeracy Scheme which supports the teaching of Numeracy across both Key Stages and is used comprehensively across the school as a teaching tool to stimulate discussion and teach strategies needed across all stages. This is further supplemented by other texts and mathematical investigations.

The school is now doing Mathletics: a computer package which promotes independence in maths with activities to complete at home and school. Children are also given lots of opportunities to apply their mathematical knowledge in well structured, well planned activities which combine many mathematical skills and knowledge.



The World Around Us

(Geography, History and Science and Technology)

The World Around Us throughout all stages is planned to connect learning across the three areas mentioned above. Children are provided with opportunities to develop their Literacy, Numeracy, ICT, Critical and Creative Thinking, Personal and Interpersonal Skills through a range of topics. At all stages children are encouraged to become active participants in the learning process, Linking learning to current events. The learning is supported by trips and excursions which enhance children's experiences and opportunities for learning. We are delighted to announce that we are now an Eco-School and have our Green Flag which is the highest accolade a school can have. Our newly refurbished outdoor garden and Poly Tunnel provide lots of opportunities for our children to develop lots of different skills.

The Arts (Art and Design, Music and Drama)

Children are able to express their ideas, feelings and interpretations of the world in diverse ways by developing their creativity through Art and Design, Music and Drama. Each individual is encouraged to explore and combine their own experiences with their imagination and natural curiosity. These are developed and built upon from year to year fostering children's artistic, musical and kinesthetic talents and intelligences. Throughout the year, many opportunities for children are offered for children to participate in role-play, assemblies, speech and drama festivals, seasonal plays and concerts.

We take part in local events and travel to Belfast to take part in National events such as the Peace Proms.

We are also currently involved with the Cleenish to Cuilcagh programme which has enabled us to work with an artist and a playwright to date exploring our cultural heritage.

Currently we have traditional and classical music on offer in the school which children can take part in. We are also offering Musical Pathways to all of our children from Year 1-4.

Remote Learning / Blended Learning

Over the last year the school has introduced Remote Learning and Blended Learning for our children. This was particularly important during lockdown and continues to be vitally important for children who are self-isolating or who are off school for other reasons. We offer our remote learning/ blended learning now across two platforms: Through the Home Learning page on our school website (for which all parents have a password) teachers are able to set work from packs which have been sent home for use in the event of children being off school. We also provide Remote Learning via SeeSaw which is an app which allows us to set activities and pieces of work for our children to complete at home and for us to communicate directly with our families. Children can then send us back the work via Seesaw to be corrected and commented on by their teacher. They can also send us back little videos and let us know how they are getting on at home .This ensures that we are always able to communicate with our families regardless of the circumstances.

Physical Education

The PE curriculum includes games, athletics, swimming and dance. Through a wide range of physical activities children will develop their knowledge, understanding and skills by participating in a broad and balanced physical education programme.

Facilities for sport in the school include a large games hall and marked playgrounds for games such as hop scotch, rounders etc. The markings in the playground also allow for team games such as football, basketball, netball and athletics. The school also has access to our local Gaelic football pitch suitable for Gaelic, camogie and hurling. Swimming lessons are provided by qualified ASA swimming coaches at Fermanagh Lakeland Forum. Coaches from GAA come in to the school to teach Gaelic and Hurling. The school also uses coaches for Netball, Athletics and Hip-Hop.

The range of sporting activities available to the children include; Athletics, Rugby, Dance, Gaelic Football, Cross Country, Hurling, Netball, Playground games, Rounders, Soccer, Swimming, Hip-Hop and Skipping activities, as well as Tennis and Yoga this year.



The highlight of last year for our Gaelic players was winning both the boys and the girls Division 2 Finals at Brewster Park. It was a fantastic day for the whole school.



Religion

The Religious Education programme of study holds a central position within the school curriculum. Sacraments celebrated during primary school include:

- Reconciliation
- Holy Communion
- Confirmation

Religious Education seeks not only to impart knowledge but also to develop understanding of religious experiences, feelings and attitudes. It is concerned with the spiritual growth of the individual, both in relation to the school and parish community.

The school chaplain, Fr Seamus Quinn visits the school regularly and celebrates class masses, throughout the year. Masses are also arranged to mark special occasions e.g. beginning of the year (September), Year 7 Thanksgiving Mass (June). These liturgies are made as relevant and meaningful as possible by encouraging the active involvement of the pupils, parents and staff. Prayer Services are held throughout the year for years 1 - 7.

All pupils follow the recommended Grow in Love series. Teachers pass on Christian values and beliefs through example and personal witness. Our religious faith is also celebrated through numerous assemblies, concerts and outside events which occur throughout the school year. Our pupils fund-raise for numerous charities showing generosity and concern for

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

In St Mary's Primary School, we believe that Personal Development and Mutual Understanding is very much about the development of values and attitudes, learning in this area is therefore active, with children being encouraged to investigate for themselves, to suggest solutions and to make decisions based on what they have learned, thus helping them to become more confident, independent and responsible when making decisions and choices throughout their lives. We have recently introduced the PATHs programme (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies) to support and develop social and emotional education across the school.

Children will experience these skills and attitudes through 2 strands:

- Personal understanding and health
- Mutual understanding in the local and global community

We aim to enhance the emotional development of the children, their understanding of themselves and their relationships with others. Children are given frequent opportunities to enhance their self-esteem and confidence by making choices and decisions and working co-operatively with others in the classroom.



Roots of Empathy

Over the last few years the school has been working through the Roots of Empathy Programme. This programme involves children from Year Four looking at life and relationships through the eyes of a baby. This year Fiadh McLaughlin is our Roots of Empathy baby.



Shared Education

Our school is currently is part of The Claddagh Glen Learning Community. We collaborate with three other local schools: Florencecourt Primary School, St Mary's, Killesher and St Naile's, Kinawley in delivering the Shared Education Programmme.

Through Shared Education our children work, learn and play with the children from all the other schools developing, deepening and enhancing their relationships with children from all communities.



Health Education

The school operates a Healthy Eating Policy. This ensures that there is always a focus on children's health and well-being. In the Foundation Stage children bring a healthy snack at break-times and older children can avail of our fruit tuck-shop available, where the children can purchase a piece of fruit at break-time or indeed bring their own with them. Our school canteen provides healthy, balanced lunches every day. As you are aware there has been a lot of research done recently into the benefits of drinking water throughout the day. To this end we encourage our pupils to drink more water every day. Pupils are allowed to bring a bottle of water to school each day to drink

The school has recently been awarded the Smart Snack Award is the proud holder of the GOLD Award for Health Promoting Schools.

Children are taught how to live fit and active lives.



Extra Curricular activities

This year the school provides After-school activities for Years Three -Seven which begin at 3.15 p.m. and end at 4.15 p.m. These include a very popular gardening club, netball, gaelic, soccer, running etc (Currently suspended due to COVID_19 restrictions but will resume as soon as possible0

We will endeavour to offer a range of activities to children of all ages throughout the year.

The school provides a wide range of extra-curricular activities, such as school outings to The Ulster American Folk Park, W5, Belfast Zoo, Florencecourt, Peace Proms, and many, many more.

We also bring many visitors in to the school enhance children's understanding of a particular area e.g. Storytellers, Authors, Firemen, Ambulance, PSNI, Science/Technology Fair, Action Mental Health, FIND, Sentinus, Santa etc and we actively encourage the children's families to come to the school as often as possible.

We have strong links with other countries throughout the world. We celebrate different cultures and beliefs.

Children experience a wide and varied curriculum and given lots of opportunities to develop all aspects of their being.

Assessment

Children are continuously assessed using a variety of formal and informal testing. Assessment For Learning is an integral part of the Revised Curriculum. We see assessment as an integral part of the learning process, as children are actively involved in their own learning. We do this by

- Sharing learning intentions with children
- Developing their awareness of the skills and knowledge that are being developed
- Developing their awareness of the strategies they employ in their learning.

We ensure that children are given effective feedback which challenges and improves the quality of children's work as well as giving children an immediate and positive boost to their self-esteem.

We also encourage children in the use of peer and self-assessment so that they can improve their own and others work.

The school also tests children regularly to ensure that they are making appropriate progress. These tests are carried out systematically throughout the year and a summative assessment is carried out at the end of the year.

The results of these tests are available to parents at any time.

Records of attainment and progression are kept on each child. These are passed onto each successive teacher and are used to inform teacher's planning for the future needs of each child.

At the end of each key stage the children take part in statutory assessments of Maths and English .

At the end of Year Seven pupils will transfer to post primary schools following the procedures as laid down by EA Western Region .Parents will be very much involved in the whole transfer process and will afforded every opportunity to meet the class teacher and Principal for advice and support.

Special Educational Needs

Care is taken at all times to match the curricular provision for all pupils to their particular stage of development and to take account of any difficulties or special talents which may emerge, the Code of Practice for pupils with Special Educational Needs is being fully implemented throughout the school.

If a pupil is identified by their class teacher as having a particular need advice will be sought from the SENCO (Special Educational Needs Coordinator), parents will be informed and an individual education plan will be drawn up to ensure that the needs of the child are fully met. When necessary the SENCO will seek advice and support from the EA who will then provide additional help and resources to fully meet the needs of the child. At all times parents will be kept fully informed and given support and advice on how to best help their children at home.

Homework

This school believes in the value of homework as it gives the child an opportunity to consolidate, reinforce and practice learning experiences from school. It also gives parents an opportunity to involve themselves in the educational development of their own children and encourages better home/school links.

Children's homework will cover the full range of subjects as laid down in the National Curriculum but will vary according to the needs and abilities of the children. The homework will include written, mental and oral work-children will be asked to read, learn tables and spellings, complete set exercises in Maths and English as well as practising musical instruments and undertaking some type of research for project work in Year 7.

The period of time a child should spend at homework will vary from child to child but guidelines are set out in the school's homework policy which is available from the school.

Meetings will be held throughout the year to guide and support parents in how best to help their children at home. If at any time your child is having difficulty with their homework please inform the class teacher as soon as possible so that the matter may be addressed.

Home/School Links

The school welcomes parents and strives to ensure that good relationships exist between parents and the school and parents are welcomed into the school at all times. Parents are kept fully informed of everything going on in the school through newsletters and parent information leaflets. We also provide a text messaging and email service for parents whereby we will text you and let you know of any important events coming up in the school e.g. Assemblies, Christmas Shows etc. You can keep up to date with everything going on at www.stmaryspsmullymesker.com

Our school uses SEESAW to communicate with parents and children, this is particularly useful if children are off or are self-isolating. Children love the activities which are on offer.

The School Day

Year 1 and 2 Class begins at 9.15 a.m. and ends at 2.15 p.m.

Year 3-7 Class begins at 9.15 a.m. and ends at 3.15 p.m.

Break All pupils have a break from 10.45-11.00 a.m.,

when milk is available from school.

<u>Dinner</u>

Year 1-4 12.15-1.00 p.m.

Year 5-7 1.00-1.45 p.m.

The school canteen offers high quality meals through our cafeteria system or pupils may bring a packed lunch.

Dinner times may change depending on activities being offered.

After school activities begin at 3.15 pm and end at 4.15 pm.

At the beginning of the school year parents are asked to fill in a form detailing travel arrangements home from school.

It is essential that all children arrive in good time for school, properly attired in their full school uniform. All pupils must attend school for the full 185 days as is required by law. If a child should miss school through illness, bereavement or for any other reason the school must be informed either by telephone or in written form i.e. a note explaining the circumstances. The Educational Welfare Officer visits each school every month and monitors attendance.

Rationale for the Plan

- 1) To minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school
- 2) To clean hands thoroughly more often than usual
- 3) To ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach

- 4) To carry enhanced cleaning, including regular cleaning of frequently touched surfaces
- 5) To minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible (as per guidance)
- 6) To where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE)

Response to any infection

- 7) To engage with the NHS Test and Trace process if required.
- 8) To manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community
- 9) To contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice

<u>Children will arriving at the school from 8.50 a.m.</u>: there will be no breakfast club until further notice. Children can enter the school via both entrances. Younger children should be brought to their classrooms if necessary.

9.10 a.m Children/Families with surnames M-Mc

9.20 a.m Children with surnames N-W

Children who use school transport will be collected off the bus by a member of staff and brought to their classrooms.

<u>Arrangements for collecting children from Tuesday 1st September</u> P1/2

(Year One children will be collected at different times until the end of September)

We have large numbers of children in Year one and Two so children must be collected at their designated time so as to avoid a build-up of parents at the gate and to ensure social distancing. Year One children may be collected from the gate at the side of the Millennium Hall, Year Two

children may be collected from the gate at the main road. Staff will bring children out to you.

Children who use school transport will be put on the bus by a member of staff in the evenings. Arrangements for collection are as follows:

- Year 1: Parents should wait at the gate below the Millennium Hall. The staff will come out and ask 1 child at a time to go to their parent. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff. Parents should exit via the main school pedestrian gate.
- Year 2: Parents should wait at the gate at the side of the school on the main road. The staff will come out and ask 1 child at a time to go to their parent. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff. Parents should exit via the main school pedestrian gate.
- Year 3: Parents should wait outside the main school gate. Parents should wait in line (2m distance) Children will be sent out to their parent. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff.
- Year 4: Parents should wait outside the main school gate. Parents should wait in line (2m distance). The class teacher will walk the class out. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff.
- Year 5: Parents should wait outside the main school gate. Parents should wait in line (2m distance). The class teacher will walk the class out. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff.
- Year 6: Parents should wait outside the main school gate. Parents should wait in line (2m distance). The class teacher will walk the class out. Children will be sent out to their parents or sent on if they are allowed to walk on home. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff. Parents should exit via the main school pedestrian gate.
- Year 7: Parents should wait outside the Millennium Hall (for now) and later on the main school gate. Parents should wait in line (2m distance). The class teacher will walk the class out. Children will be sent out to their parents or sent on if they are allowed to walk on home. Adults must not come into the building or go near staff. Parents should exit via the main school pedestrian gate.
- All children should wash their hands before leaving.

Late Arrival

 Staff will be outside on duty for the drop of duration and will bring in any initial late comers. Parents will need to bring children around to the main entrance but should not come into the building. They should phone into school (028 66348598) and a member of staff will usher the child in. The child will sanitise their hands and be escorted / sent to their classroom.

Late Collection:

- Children will remain in class / waiting area and parents will need to pick up from there.
- If a parent is 10 minutes or more late, staff should alert the main office and phone calls will be made. Children remain outside where possible or be taken back to their classes, while we wait for parents.

When lining up for school please adhere to the markings on the pavement/road.

- Only one parent should come with a child to school to minimise the number of adults on site.
- Parents will not be allowed to enter the school premises.

Break and Lunch

Break:

- Children need to bring their own snack and drink in a lunchbox (Clearly labelled with their name)
- Children will have staggered breaks.

Lunch

- Children will remain in their classroom bubbles for lunch.
- School dinners are still available from 1st September and will be brought to each "bubble" at lunchtimes by dinner staff.
- If your child is taking packed lunches, please send in their lunch in a lunchbox which can be regularly cleaned.
- Children will have staggered lunch breaks.

Safety and well-being for pupils

At St Mary's, we have a very strong ethos of understanding and support of the emotional wellbeing of pupils and with this in mind, these additional principles will need to drive the design of our wider opening plan: We want to

- Ensure that returning children feel emotionally and physically safe at school through the use of our positive implementation of new requirements; use of positive language "We can't do that at the moment but let's see what we can do..."
- Ensure only essential minimal changes take place in classrooms and wider school areas including class layouts, resources, markings.
- Ensure enough time and resources are given to the social and emotional aspects of the curriculum and allow children to express themselves in a safe environment.

- Ensure a mechanism is in place to offer effective 1:1 pastoral support if needed.
- Ensure those not attending due to shielding or illness have similar opportunities where possible through access to remote or supported learning.
- Ensure all children are in a protected "Bubble"

Our Bubbles

Each class will become a 'Bubble'.

Each bubble will:

- Stay as a group throughout the day and not mix with any other bubbles (where possible).
- Have the same adult(s) where possible and where this is not the case, ensure staff social distance and have good hygiene
- Lunch staff will be assigned to a class and year group for supervision and will remain with them from collection, to dinner, to play.

What to bring to your Bubble

- Children should only bring their lunchbox (to contain their snack and packed lunch (if necessary) and a coat, nothing else is permitted at this time.
- Children should wear school uniform.
- Children will NOT be getting changed for PE therefore trainers,
 rather than school shoes, are allowed at the moment until any updated
 quidance is released.
- Although not a requirement, you may like to ensure that children are
 in fully cleaned clothes each day and clothes worn in school are taken
 off as soon as returning home and placed straight into the wash.

Protective Measures & Arrangements

- Children in year one and two will be seated in small groups within their bubble.
- Children from year three to seven are all sitting at a desk on their own at a social distance of at least 1m. They are all arranged facing the front so children are not facing each other.
- Children will not move between tables or groups, wherever possible.
- All children will have a tray on/under their desk for their equipment (pens, pencils, glue stick, ruler, rubber and their class books etc)
- Coats will be hung on a cloakroom peg as they enter.
- Lunch bags will be placed in a box in the class as they enter.

- A returns box for reading books should be set up so that box can be left for 72
 hours before being touched and returned to the shelves.
- Teaching will take place in the classroom space or outdoor spaces. Before moving to a new space hands must be washed by everyone.
- Windows will be open for ventilation as much as possible.
- External doors will remain closed for security and will be held open by an adult or wedged open when being used. Doors will not be held open by each child to pass to the next person.
- The classroom door will be open to avoid touching of handles and enable increased ventilation.

Children who have additional vulnerabilities will be seated in places where there is less movement of children and better ventilation.

In the event that any cases of COVID 19 are confirmed within a Bubble, families will be notified and the Bubble closed immediately. All other Bubbles will continue to operate as normal unless cases are identified in those. Parents must have arrangements in place to collect children in the event of immediate closure.

Hygiene

- Children will wash their hands regularly including the start of the day, after any outdoor play, before and after lunch and before they go home.
- Children will also wash their hands or use sanitiser if they cough or sneeze in class or have used shared equipment and of course after using the toilet. "Catch it, Bin it, Kill it" strategy will be taught to all children.
- Children and staff will wash or sanitise their hands as they enter school. How to wash hands, will be modelled and supervised for younger children. There will be staggered times for children to wash hands.
- Children and staff will be permitted to bring their own hand sanitiser into school as long as it is at least 70% Ethanol.
- Staff will revisit hand hygiene regularly with pupils including a demonstration or by using age appropriate materials.
- Bins will be positioned away from children and staff in each room
- Classrooms will have hand sanitiser but ideally soap and water should be used for classbased hand washing. Hand sanitiser could be used for occasional use after coughing and sneezing etc.
- Classrooms will also have a supply of paper towels and tissues.
- Posters will be displayed to remind children about how to wash their hands.
- Bins will be emptied as part of the cleaning schedule at the end of the day.
- Sanitiser stations will be in all communal areas mainly for adults and occasional pupil use where permitted. Children will wash hands before eating. Soap and water are best from the classroom sink.
- Gloves are not recommended to be worn all the time, as they provide a false sense of safety and are difficult to take off without contamination. However, where a member of staff is treating a pupil or dealing with intimate care, it is recommended gloves and usual PPE is worn and then disposed of safely afterwards

Toileting

 There will be staggered times for using the toilets. Ensure children flush and properly clean hands afterwards. Staff should avoid being in the toilet areas. Parents please ensure you have completed and returned an intimate care form if your child may need any help.

- If children need to use the toilet during outside time, break or lunch they will only use the following:
 - Year 1: -all children use toilets beside the classroom.
 - Year 2 and 3: use allocated toilet in toilets beside classroom.
 - Year 4: -use toilet in classroom,
 - Year 5/6/7:-use toilets in new mobile

Cleaning

- Cleaning routines will follow the Government guidance and the Building Supervisor will liaise with the Education Authority to agree any additional cleaning required.
- All classrooms will be cleaned daily, at the usual times, with particular focus on high contact areas.
- Doors should be left open unless kept closed for safety or security.
- Lights should be left on and pupils told not to use the switches.
- Toilets will be cleaned at the end of the school day, paying attention to taps, handles and toilet seats.
- Classrooms will be equipped with cleaning fluid and cloths to wipe surfaces when needed. Staff will wash their hands thoroughly after doing any cleaning.
- Any resources and play equipment (Early Years) used by children will be washed periodically with soap and warm water or put into quarantine for at least 72 hours.

Distancing and adult to child contact

- It will be difficult to fully distance staff from pupils especially the younger they are, however staff will endeavour to stay 2m away from children and other staff.
- Staff will not sit face to face -they will try to be away from direct contact with faces.
- Staff will be mindful of other staff in class and around the school, maintaining distancing, where possible.
- There will be reduced and coordinated movement within school, achieved through staggered playtimes and lunchtimes. Therefore, there is no need for a one-way system as enforcing it could increase the times children and staff are in the corridors. However, staff and children are encouraged to continue with a 'stay left approach'.
- Children will be limited in using the main corridors or other shared spaces as much as possible; shortest exit routes should be used.
- The number of pupils inside the toilets will be limited to one.

Outdoor Spaces

- The field and outside playground at the front and sides will be able to be used. Mixing classes outside will not happen, although 2 classes may be outside, socially distanced safely.
- Playgrounds will be split into sections to ensure bubbles are not mixing There will be a
 rota to enable the different bubbles to have access to different parts of the
 playground over the weeks.
- Equipment such as footballs can be used by the individual bubbles with access to this.
 Children will need to be shown how to play while attempting to keep a social distance, while staff will understand that this will be tricky for some children to achieve. In these cases, staff should ensure they are keeping a good supervisory distance away and maintaining the child to adult social distancing.
- Equipment WILL NOT be shared between bubbles unless it has either been quarantined for at least 72 hours or cleaned.

Medication & Illness

If your child displays any Covid-like symptons, they must not attend school. Please see our COVID-19 What-if page for further information.

If your child requires medication for an ongoing medical condition such as asthma, diabetes etc please inform the school. We will continue to administer this medication to children who require it. Please email the school if your child requires GP-prescribed medication throughout the day.

We will not administer calpol/anti-biotics etc until further notice as any child who requires this medication will be under par and should not be at school as they would be more vulnerable to infection.

If your child has a serious health condition (clinically extremely vulnerable), please speak to their doctor or specialist medical staff (if involved) and get medical advice immediately as to whether your child should return to school. Please inform the school immediately and we will then work together to create a Risk Assessment specific to your child where appropriate.

Children who are living with someone who was previously shielding , should have an individual Risk Assessment conducted before their return, please contact us to discuss this.

After school clubs/Breakfast Club

- These will not take place initially
- Clear records of attendance will be in place for track and trace purposes when they do start.

Office & Communications

- The office will be open to essential visitors only, with parents encouraged to communicate via e-mail or telephone.
 - The office window will remain closed to protect staff within the office.
- A drop off box on the school front foyer will be available to avoid face to face contact.
- Parents should communicate with the child's teacher via email or telephone, please be
 advised teachers will only be able to respond to phone-calls/emails etc after teaching
 hours.
- Updates for parents will be sent via website or social media.
- All contact forms will be re-issued to you for updated information, please include your email address.

Monies

All money must be sent into the school in an envelope clearly marked with the child's name and the purpose of the money i.e dinner money etc. Money will not be accepted any other way. Money will then be left for 72 hrs before being touched by staff.

Use of PPE in school;

PPE will be used in school in certain situations

- PPE will be available for any member of staff who requires it to assist with a pupil in close proximity, including personal care.
- PPE will be worn when staff support changing of a child's clothes ,changing the child from the side in a ventilated room.
- If a child requires first aid to be closely administered.
- If there is a suspected case of Coronavirus.
- If a parent requires their child to wear a mask, then they should contact the school office to discuss this
